



Advice following cataract extraction and lens implantation

This leaflet is for patients who have had cataract surgery and lens implantation. It offers advice on caring for your eye immediately after surgery.

Pain relief

It is common for your eye to feel scratchy as though there is something in it for a day or two but it is unusual for the eye to be painful after this operation. Paracetamol or your usual painkillers should usually provide adequate pain relief – follow the dosage instructions on the packet. If pain increases or is not controlled at home then you should attend Eye Casualty. Please see the opening hours at the end of this leaflet.

Caring for your eye

- We will ask you to remove the eye shield and/or pad the morning after the operation. If the lashes are sticky or gummed up, gently wipe your eyelids with gauze and cooled, boiled water, but it is important to avoid rubbing the eye itself.
- You should throw away the white pad, but keep the clear plastic shield. This must be worn at night for two weeks following the operation.
- Sunglasses or normal glasses should be worn during the day to protect the eye.

Eye drops

- We will give you eye drops containing a mixture of antibiotic and antiinflammatory drugs. Please use these drops as advised on discharge.
- If you are allergic to preservative, you will get the antibiotic and steroid drops separately.
- If you are running out of the drops, please contact the unit where you had your surgery for a replacement; contact details are listed on this leaflet. Please do not stop using the eye drops until your eye doctor advises you to do so.

• If you use other eye drops for conditions such as dry eye or glaucoma, you must open a new bottle for the operated eye and avoid using it in the other eye to prevent infection. They can be used at the same time as your new drops

Washing

Please take care around the eye area when washing your hair and face for the first two weeks. You can lower the showerhead to avoid water from splashing into your eyes. Eye makeup should be avoided for two weeks.

Resuming daily activities

Avoid vigorous exercise such as heavy gardening, sports (particularly swimming), carrying heavy loads etc, for the first two weeks. Gentle activity is encouraged and reading/ computer work/watching television is not harmful.

Driving

You should be able to drive after two or three days as long as the sight in the other eye is good and the operated eye is comfortable. You must be able to read (with glasses or contact lenses) a car number plate at 20 metres (approximately 22 yards) and meet the minimum visual acuity and field of vision with the unaffected eye – your optician can advise and do a test. You can return to your optician after four to six weeks for an eye test <u>www.gov.uk/driving-eyesight-rules</u>.

Vision and follow-up visit

Your eyesight should improve in the operated eye after a day or two. We do not routinely see patients for a post-operative review following surgery. Instead, a computer system called Dora will telephone you after your surgery to check you are doing well and answer any questions you have. You can speak to Dora like a person. Dora has been specially trained to conduct cataract surgery reviews. You will receive this phone call approximately 3 weeks after your operation. The nurse will provide you with information about this before you are discharged. At times, due to complexity of the procedure or pre-existing eye conditions, a follow-up appointment in the eye clinic may be necessary. You will be advised of this on discharge. You will be asked to visit your local optician 5-6 weeks after surgery in order to be reviewed for new spectacles.

Problems or questions

If the operated eye becomes painful, the vision deteriorates or you develop nausea or vomiting, go to Eye Casualty.
