



Instructions to prepare for your eye operation under general anaesthetic (GA) happening in the morning

Information for patients attending the Eye Day Unit, Royal Berkshire Hospital, Reading RG1 5AN

Date o	f operation:	

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On the morning of your operation before going into hospital:



- You can eat until 2.30am on the morning of your surgery.
- Take your medication consisting of





- You can have clear fluids until 6.30am on the morning of your surgery.
- Clear fluids include: water, black tea and black coffee (no sugar or sweeteners), watery squash but not fruit juice.
- We recommend you do have a drink of water at 6.30am.



 Do not suck sweets or chew gum on the day of your operations.



 It is a good idea to take a bath or a shower before coming into hospital.




- Wear loose, comfortable clothing.
- Do not bring any jewellery or valuables (wedding rings are ok).
- Do not wear any make up including nail varnish.

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- Remember to pack the following items into a bag ready to bring in:
 - Hospital information / letters
 - Tablets in their original packets
 - Dressing gown and slippers
 - Eye glasses
 - Any mobility aids you normally use,
 e.g. walking sticks.

Going into hospital



- You need to arrive at Eye Day Unit, L3
 Eye Block at the Royal Berkshire
 Hospital in Reading by 7.30am.
- Don't forget to bring your bag with you!

Before your operation



- You will be asked to sit in a chair on the Eye Day Unit.
- You will be transferred to the ward after you have had your surgery.




 The admitting nurse will confirm your details, ask you some questions and check your blood pressure, pulse and temperature. You may have your blood sugar level measured.



 Drops may be put into your eye before surgery, this will depend on the type of procedure you are having.



- The doctor / surgeon will speak to you again about the operation and will ask you to sign a consent form if you are happy to go ahead with treatment.
- Do not be frightened to ask any questions or to discuss any worries you may have with the doctor or nurse on the Eye Day Unit.



 Before the operation you may be given a tablet to help you feel relaxed. You will only have this if you and your doctor agree that it is needed.

Having the operation




 You will then be taken to the eye theatre where you will be checked in, and after that given your anaesthetic so that you can have your operation.

After the operation



- After a general anaesthetic you will go into a recovery ward before being taken back to another ward to allow time for the anaesthetic to wear off.
- You will be monitored by the nurses during this time.



- The eye doctor may check that you are ok and, if it is not padded, look at your eye.
- Some problems with the eye and sight are common. In particular, you might experience a scratching feeling – this will improve over the next 3 or 4 weeks.
- You <u>must not rub your eye</u> while it is recovering from surgery.



 When you are recovered enough you will be offered something to eat and drink.



- A nurse will talk to you about caring for your eye after leaving hospital.
- You will be provided with the eye drops or ointment needed after surgery and copy of your discharge letter.

Going home



 We ask that a responsible adult be available to take you home and look after you for at least 24 hours following a general anaesthetic.



 Arrangements must be made for a private car or taxi to transport you home following your discharge from the ward.



 You will need to put drops in to your eye until your next clinic appointment with the doctor.



 You can bath and wash your hair 48hours after the operation but avoid getting soap or shampoo in your eye for 2 weeks following surgery.



 The nurse on the Eye Day Unit will advise when it is appropriate to drive post-op but you may be recommended to wait until your follow-up appointment.



 Following cataract surgery you can do moderate exercises, such as brisk walking after you have recovered from your anaesthetic.

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For other eye surgery, check with your doctor or nurse before starting to exercise.

You can restart sports activities 2 weeks after surgery.



 You may be advised to contact your optician post-op to arrange a follow-up appointment.
