### What is secondary breast cancer?

Secondary breast cancer occurs when breast cancer cells spread from the primary (first) cancer in the breast to other parts of the body through the lymphatic system or the bloodstream. Some people may be diagnosed with primary and secondary breast cancer at the same time. You may also hear secondary breast cancer referred to as:

- metastatic breast cancer / metastases
- advanced breast cancer
- secondary tumours / secondaries
- stage 4 breast cancer

Secondary breast cancer can be treated, but it can't be cured. Treatment aims to control the cancer, relieve any symptoms and maintain your health and wellbeing so that you can have a good quality of life for as long as possible.

### Finding information and support

Coping with a diagnosis of secondary breast cancer can be overwhelming, but support is available.

In the days or weeks after your diagnosis, you may find it hard to think clearly. You may experience many different emotions. However difficult it may seem, you can have some control over how you manage the illness and deal with the emotional and practical issues it brings.

Breast Cancer Now's Secondary Breast Cancer Information Pack contains information on treating the disease and coping with its impact, as well as signposting you to sources of support. ### How can we help you?

## Tell us your concerns

Identifying your different needs and concerns is important as it means we can help you get the appropriate support. A holistic needs assessment (HNA) checklist helps you to think about your needs and concerns across all areas of your life and find possible solutions. We will offer an assessment 3-6 weeks following your first oncology appointment, but if you would like one sooner please let us know. We also offer a nurse-led symptom management clinic alongside the Enhanced Supportive Care team (ESC). This is where you can discuss any symptoms you are experiencing from your cancer or treatment, talk about the future and any uncertainty or worries you may have. The ESC team can offer further support and advice.

## **Meeting others**

It can be hard to find anyone who understands what it's like to be diagnosed with Secondary Breast Cancer. Breast Cancer Now, has Living with Secondary Breast Cancer Groups that provide the chance to meet others who understand what you're going through because they're going through it too.
